School Hours:

Baby Steps Early Learning Centre is open from 7am to 17h30pm daily.

Please note penalties will incur for late pickups, R100 for every 10mins, payable to the Manager directly, this will be added to your school bill if not payable to the manager in charge.

School Access and Security:

We understand that dropping your child off at school can be a stressful experience, however, we would like to emphasize that limited access into the school premises is essential for the safety of your child.

We have noticed that parents and grandparents often leave the school gates open, which can compromise the safety of your child. It is vital that we maintain a secure and controlled environment to ensure the safety and well-being of all our students. Our security guard is responsible for enforcing this policy and ensuring that all children are protected.

Moreover, we encourage parents to keep their interactions with teachers brief during drop-off times. Long chats can lead to a lack of supervision and teaching, which can be disruptive to the learning environment. We value the quality of education that we offer, and we want to ensure that every minute of the teaching day counts.

We appreciate your co-operation in this matter and hope that you understand the importance of our safety policies. If you have any concerns, please do not hesitate to contact us.

Security guards: Please treat the security guards with courtesy should they need to stop you or inconvenience you in any way during the course of their duties. They have been empowered to search cars randomly if a need arises. Please remember that they are there for your child's protection. Car access stickers: access stickers are allocated to each family upon enrolment. Cars not displaying access stickers on the windscreen will not be allowed into the school without signing in. Additional stickers are available from the office. Students leaving early: Should a student need to leave school early for a particular reason, approval needs to be gained from the relevant class teacher and school manager. A written note, email or WhatsApp is required the day before or in advance.

School fee structure and payments:

School fees are paid on or before the 1st of each month in advance over 12 months. Full fees are required for December and January.

School fees can be paid electronically into our school bank account. We have card machines available on the premises as well. No cash is accepted and kept on the premises.

Health and Safety Protocol:

No Toys allowed:

There are several potential dangers associated with bringing toys from home to preschool. Here are some of the most significant ones:

Risk of Loss or Damage: Young children are often forgetful and may lose their toys or accidentally damage them during playtime at preschool. This could lead to tears and frustration for the child, as well as potential conflict with other children who may have borrowed or accidentally damaged the toy.

Spread of Germs:

Toys brought from home may not be cleaned regularly or may be contaminated with germs or bacteria. This can be exceptionally problematic in preschool settings where children are in close contact with one another, potentially spreading germs and illnesses.

Distractions from Learning:

Bringing toys from home may distract children from the educational activities and lessons planned by the preschool teacher. This can lead to a loss of focus and participation in the learning process.

Conflict with Other Children:

Children may become possessive of their toys and unwilling to share with others. This can lead to conflicts and potentially disruptive behaviour in the classroom.

Safety Concerns:

Toys brought from home may not meet safety standards and could pose a danger to the child or other children. For example, small parts that can be easily swallowed by young children or sharp edges that could cause injury.

For these reasons, it is often recommended that parents leave toys at home when their child attends preschool. Instead, preschools generally provide a variety of age-appropriate toys and learning materials for children to use during the day.

Soiled Clothing Protocol

We want to take a moment to explain our protocol for handling soiled clothes when changing diapers at school, as well as the reasons behind this procedure. Ensuring a clean and safe environment for your child is our top priority, and this protocol helps us achieve that goal.

When your child has a nappy change at school and their clothes become soiled, we follow these steps:

- I. Immediate Change: When we notice that a nappy change is needed and there is a mess on your child's clothes, we promptly change them into fresh, clean clothing from their spare set provided by you. This is done to ensure their comfort and hygiene.
- 2. Containment in Plastic Bag: The soiled clothes are rinsed and carefully placed in a plastic bag. This step is crucial for several reasons:
 - a. Hygiene: Soiled clothing can carry bacteria and germs. By placing it in a sealed plastic bag, we prevent any contamination of other items or surfaces in the classroom. Soiled clothes can carry bacteria, germs, and potentially harmful pathogens. Attempting to clean them at school could risk spreading these contaminants to other areas, surfaces, or objects in the immediate vicinity. By placing the soiled clothes in a sealed bag, we minimize the risk of cross-contamination and maintain a hygienic environment.
 - b. Odour Control: Properly sealing the soiled clothes in a plastic bag helps contain any unpleasant odours, maintaining a more pleasant environment for everyone.
 - c. Prevention of Cross-Contamination: We want to minimize the risk of transferring any contaminants from the soiled clothes to other items, including your child's clean clothes or personal belongings.
- 3. Returning Soiled Clothes: At the end of the day or when you pick up your child, we will return the sealed plastic bag with the soiled clothes to you. No soiled items are allowed in the kitchen where the food is prepared and where the washing machine is situated. Therefore, we ask that you take the bag home.
- 4. Baby Class: This area in particular is very high risk as bottles are prepared and nappies are changed. Teachers need to ensure that their hands are sanitised after every nappy change and soiled clothing immediately put in a sealed bag. Many illnesses are spread in this way.

By adhering to this protocol set out by the GDE, we ensure the safety, hygiene and comfort of all children in our care. We appreciate your understanding and co-operation in maintaining a clean and healthy environment for everyone at our school.

Baby Steps Potty Training Guide

The parents' role in potty training.

Potty training typically begins between the ages of 18 months and 3 years old, but the exact timing can vary for each child based on their physical and cognitive development, as well as their readiness to learn this new skill. Here are some key aspects of the parent's role in potty training:

- 1. Assessing readiness: Parents should look for signs that their child is ready to begin potty training. These signs may include the ability to follow simple instructions, demonstrating interest in using the toilet, expressing discomfort when diapers are wet or soiled, and staying dry for longer periods.
- 2. Establishing a routine: Parents should create a consistent routine for potty training, which can involve setting specific times for using the toilet, such as after waking up, before bedtime, or at regular intervals during the day.
- 3. Providing support and encouragement: Parents need to be patient and supportive during the potty-training process, offering praise and encouragement when their child successfully uses the toilet. This positive reinforcement helps build confidence and motivation.
- 4. Modelling proper behaviour: Parents can demonstrate proper toileting habits by using the bathroom themselves and discussing what they are doing. This helps children understand the process and expectations.
- 5. Teaching hygiene: Parents should teach their child the importance of proper hygiene, including handwashing after using the toilet.
- 6. Addressing accidents: Accidents are a normal part of the potty-training process, and parents should respond calmly and reassuringly, reminding their child that it takes time and practice to master this skill.
- 7. Transitioning from nappies to underwear: When the child is consistently using the toilet, parents can gradually introduce underwear as a sign of progress and growing independence.

Remember that each child is unique, and the timeline for potty training will vary. It's important for parents to be patient and flexible, adapting their approach as needed to best support their child's learning and development.

What is the teacher's role in assisting the parent and child with potty training.

Teachers play an important supporting role in the potty-training process, particularly for children attending Baby Steps. They can help reinforce the potty-training efforts initiated by parents and provide consistency across different environments. Here are some ways teachers can assist parents and children with potty training:

- 1. Communication with parents: Teachers should maintain open lines of communication with parents, discussing the child's progress, challenges, and any specific strategies used at home. This helps ensure a consistent approach and reinforces the child's learning.
- 2. Establishing a routine: Teachers can help establish and maintain a consistent potty routine at school, just as parents do at home. This may involve scheduled bathroom breaks or regular reminders to use the restroom.
- 3. Monitoring and assistance: Teachers should closely observe children for signs that they need to use the bathroom and offer assistance as needed, especially for younger children who may require help with tasks like pulling down pants, wiping, or washing hands.
- 4. Offering encouragement and praise: Teachers can provide positive reinforcement by praising children for successfully using the toilet and following proper hygiene practices. This encouragement can boost children's confidence and motivation.
- 5. Addressing accidents: Teachers should respond calmly and supportively to accidents, understanding that they are a normal part of the potty-training process. They should reassure the child and help them clean up, reminding them that learning takes time and practice.
- 6. Providing a safe and comfortable environment: Teachers should ensure that the bathroom facilities are clean, accessible, and child friendly. They can also provide visual aids or step stools to help children feel more comfortable using the restroom independently.
- 7. Collaborating with other teachers assisting: If the child is in a setting with multiple teachers, it is essential for them to collaborate and share information about the child's progress and any strategies being used. This ensures that the child receives consistent support throughout the day.

By working closely with parents and providing a consistent, supportive environment, teachers can play a significant role in helping children achieve success with potty training.

We advise strongly against:

- Potty training before the child is ready.
- Potty training whilst going through a big change at home.
- Potty training during winter.
- Potty training only during school time.

Please make sure that enough clothes have been packed in for school in the event of an accident. What could be the problem if children are still not potty trained by age four?

If a child is not potty trained by the age of four, there could be various factors at play, ranging from developmental issues to emotional or environmental factors. It is essential to consider each child's unique situation and consult with a pediatrician or healthcare professional to identify and address any underlying concerns. Here are some possible reasons a child may not be potty trained by this age:

- 1. Developmental delays: Some children may experience delays in their physical, cognitive or emotional development, which can impact their ability to achieve potty training milestones.
- 2. Medical conditions: Certain medical conditions, such as chronic constipation, urinary tract infections or neurodevelopmental disorders, can make potty training more challenging.
- 3. Emotional factors: Stress, anxiety or other emotional challenges can hinder a child's ability to learn and adopt new skills like potty training. Major life changes or stressful events might contribute to these difficulties.
- 4. Behavioural issues: Some children may be resistant to potty training due to a power struggle or a lack of motivation. In these cases, it's essential to address the underlying behavioural concerns and work with the child to establish a positive and supportive environment.
- 5. Inconsistent approaches: Inconsistency in potty training methods, routines or expectations between home and school or between caregivers can make it more difficult for a child to become fully potty trained.
- 6. Learning disabilities: Children with learning disabilities might need additional support and specialized strategies to master potty training skills.
- 7. Late readiness: Every child develops at their own pace and some may simply not be ready for potty training until later than their peers.

If you're concerned about your child's potty-training progress, it's essential to consult with a pediatrician, who can assess your child's development, rule out any underlying medical issues, and provide guidance on appropriate strategies and support. It may also be helpful to work with your child's educator, occupational therapist, or a psychologist experienced in child development and potty training to help address any challenges and provide personalized guidance.

Medical Emergencies:

Emergency medicine: Should any student have a serious allergy or condition (such as asthma) and require emergency medicine to be kept at the school, this can be left with the school manager. Teachers must be informed as to where emergency medicines can be sourced and a record of this fact needs to be kept on our student files. Allergies need to be highlighted on application forms to ensure they are entered on the student's file. If your child has a medical condition or any extreme allergies, please ensure we are notified immediately. Emergency/medical details: The details we have on file are those you supplied at the time you submitted your application to Baby Steps ELC. In case of an emergency, it is essential that our records are up to date. Over-the-counter medication: The school manager has some basic over-the-counter medication available for the treatment of minor ailments. These may only be dispensed with permission from parents, and parents will be contacted should any of these medications be administered. Sacred Heart does have a registered nurse on the property.

Celebrations:

We love to recognise special occasions such as our students' birthdays, however, we do ask that you take note of the following guidelines: Birthday rings: Our birthday children are made to feel very special on this important day. Please let your class teacher and school manager know if you would like to hold a birthday ring for your child. Parents are welcome to send cupcakes and treats as well as a party pack that will be sent home with the children for safety reasons. Parents do not normally attend their children's birthday ring at school. Our teachers take photos and the manager will send it to the parents however, if you do want to attend, this can be arranged with the school manager.

Party invitations: Little people are very sensitive, and we do not want any hurt feelings so please ask your teacher to place invitations in the children's school bags instead of asking your child to hand them out, especially if you are not inviting the whole class.

Menu and lunchboxes

Please ask your school manager for a copy of the school menu.

Toddlers to Grade 00 – All meals are provided and prepared on site. Please DO NOT send any snacks or meals to school for your children. Parents of babies may send in their breast milk, formula and meals until parents are comfortable with their children eating from our school menu.

Grade R- Bring their own packed lunch. They are provided with breakfast, morning and afternoon snack.

Academics:

Senior Phase of Preschool – What to expect at Baby Steps Early Learning Centre

Scholastic achievement at school is dependent on a solid foundation. We pride ourselves on making sure that your child gets the best care and is nurtured and loved.

A huge passion of mine is school readiness. There isn't a stronger foundation than the curriculum we offer at Baby Steps Early Learning Centre. It makes me happy to know that our learners leave us very prepared for Grade 1.

School Readiness Curriculum

- Gross Motor skills: An area often overlooked but very crucial to overall development
 and can impact performance in class. Core Strength, concentration, eye -hand coordination, crossing the midline, gross of fine motor strength and pre- sport skills are
 covered.
- Music: Auditory processing, body awareness, rhythm, beat, timing.
- Baking: Measurement, quantity, life skills and sensory development.
- Perceptual skills: Auditory and visual memory and processing skills.
- Cognitive development: Thinking and reasoning skills.
- Pre math skills: Simple addition, subtraction, data handling, categorizing and basic number concepts.
- Pre-reading skills: Eye-tracking, sound recognition, blends, rhyming words and syllables.
- Language development: Vocabulary, articulation and comprehension.
 - English, Afrikaans, Zulu and sign language.
 - Exposure to Eisteddfod and termly Speech
- Social and emotional: Independence, teamwork, sharing and dealing with emotions.
- Life skills: General knowledge is enhanced weekly with our changing themes and experiments.
- Computer and Robotics: Critical thinking, coding, sequencing and technology.
- Chess: Problem solving, concentration and cognitive processing skills.
- Teaching: Children learn in different ways and we need to cater to all the different styles of learning. We try to make use of learning through all our senses. 
